When Thunderstorms Approach

Growing up, I was always a fan of an approaching storm. I loved to look out upon the horizon and see the unique cloud formations filled with darker colors and vivid imagery. These storms broke up a normal day and provided some interest to my life. To this day, I love to watch the changing nature of the weather.

Of course, others would rather not have it this way. My dog Zoey is this way. Zoey is a rescue lab that is terrified by storms. Thunder causes her to run for cover. On rainy days, Zoey retreats to a quiet corner to endure the length of the inclement weather. She will not eat or drink. In fact, if the storm begins to thunder, Zoey proceeds to pant and shake.

When my daughters were younger, thunderstorms scared them as well. Distant rumbles or sharp flashes of lightning soon found them very close to me or my wife. Storms at nighttime sometimes found them in my bed.

Storms can be troublesome and can be natural analogy to life in general. The age-old adage is true, "If you are not going through a storm, wait a while and it will change."

The question becomes how do we handle the storms of life? Some of my recent sermons have indicated that it best to turn to Psalm 121. Our God is always with us and has promised never to leave us whether we are in a storm or beneath blue skies. FPC, Columbia recently went through a storm with the departure of a pastor. Many have talked about some of the difficult times, but that storm has passed. Now members of the congregation are encountering life without an installed pastor. In some sense, it is a storm, just a different type.

Again, where does one go to find direction?

Spiritually, I am always reminding myself that God seeks the best for me. God is always working on my behalf, and I can trust God with the outcome. I do find myself praying more during these storms. I continue to "show up" before God to talk with God about my fear and my anxiety. I think that is a good thing. God always wants to hear from us.

Over the course of my life, I remind myself as well that God has always been faithful. After 61 years, I am still here, and I have lived through more trauma than I care to remember.

If I think back on some of the big storms of my life, some of my life changed as did my path. I believe God used some storms to lead me in the direction that God would have me go. So, there is a sense that the approach of a storm could be a new and developing call from God. Hence, I pay close attention not only because I have always marveled at the approach of a storm, but now God might be directing me in new and vibrant ways.

So, if you are encountering a storm, remember always that God may be doing something new, but God is always there and always willing to listen to the prayers of our heart.

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### Mission

#### Where is God in the Midst of Suffering?

The question has been asked since the beginning of time. Theologians have been quick to write their responses. The Bible gives its "Emmanuel" answer. Still, the question announces itself seemingly not fully satisfied with our words or our thoughts.

The question was asked again of me as our team visited a refugee school operated by the Synod of Syria and Lebanon near the Syrian border, only two hours by car north of Beirut. Upon arriving at the school and hearing from its leadership that question announced itself loudly.

Where is God in the midst of this suffering?

Our team of five was in the northern region of Lebanon in the small town of Minyara. The Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon, composed of about forty Presbyterian churches split between the two countries, opened up refugee schools to care for the huge number of refugee children from Syria living nearby, a few in apartments but many in tent camps. The school in Minyara is overseen by Rev. Hadi Ghantous, pastor of the Presbyterian church there. The Outreach Foundation is humbled to have supported this unique ministry from its beginning in 2016.

It is here that we find God's children, many with little medical or dental attention. There is no school for the children, nor transportation for thousands of people. So, the Synod responded by opening refugee schools to attend to the children and some of their needs.

Children came to one of these schools, a building that in another life was a three-bay garage, on a first-come, first-serve basis, with the Synod incurring the cost of the entire education process. The refugee children who attended had never been to school. A 12-year old boy had never seen a bathroom with a toilet. He, nor any of the other children, did not know their alphabet or their colors. The clothes on their backs were the ones they had been wearing for many days. It is this type of child the Synod is called to educate. It is beyond anything imaginable. Where does one begin with a lost generation of children?

Couple this challenge and place this story with Lebanon now becoming a collapsed state. There is a recipe for disaster here on a scale of unimaginable proportion. For the average Lebanese

person, unemployment is 60%, food has increased nearly 500% and wages have plummeted by 90%. There is little money to care for one's family let alone care for the refugees. The government has failed to form year after year and global, governmental relief is nowhere to be found. Corruption is a word heard everywhere.

### Mission

As we left to go to another location and to say goodbye to this place, the only question that came to my mind was this: My God, where are you in this suffering? God, you are the only one that can make sense out of this. I can't.

As the day gathered strength, however, and as we met with the lovely people of Lebanon, I kept asking myself this question. God, where are you? Slowly, in conversations while breaking bread, sipping some world-famous Lebanese wine, and eating with a Maronite monk, I have discovered that I don't think I have been asked to answer the question of where God is in the midst of suffering. The situation is bigger than I will ever understand...

God has called me to be here and to be with the people (in their suffering, as is *he*). I have been called to love these people and support them as best I can and leave the larger questions to God.



The Maury County Senior Center has received funding through the CARES Act to help our seniors with delivering, and in some cases, purchasing groceries. The programs are intended to reach older adults who are reluctant or unable to leave their homes during the pandemic. It is our hope to identify older adults in our congregation and community that may benefit from these programs.

The senior center staff and volunteers will deliver groceries to any adult in Maury County who is at least 60 years old. There is no income requirement for this program. The shopping can be done either as a grocery pickup based on the senior phoning in their order ahead of time or they will work from a shopping list. The senior is responsible for the

cost of the items. The delivery service is free with 48 hours advance notice. They will also pick up and deliver prescriptions from local pharmacies.

If you are an adult with an income of \$1800/month or less, they will shop and pay for a one-time \$75 of groceries and household supplies. They will deliver the items to the senior's home. They also have food boxes containing non-perishable items valued at \$45 each. There is no income requirement.


### **Session Notes**

The concerns and suggestions of the congregation are critical during the period of transitional ministry now facing our church. As mentioned in last month's newsletter, the session has been divided into five teams of elders charged with carefully assessing the congregation's answers to the questionnaire sent out last spring. As noted last month, the answers have been redacted to remove any information that could identify their source. The teams will report their findings to the session and present ideas gleaned from the answers on how to keep our church strong and energized.

At the session meeting on August 23, a team reported on Question 5: "As a valued member of FPCC, do you see yourself as 'hopeful,' 'discouraged,' 'enthusiastic,' or some other description?" In the spring, 47% of the respondents were "hopeful" or described their mindset as positive. Although an almost equal percent (46%) said that they were discouraged, over half of these respondents expressed hope for the future.

How would you describe yourself today? The reporting team believed that today's respondents would be described as relieved, hopeful and enthusiastic and that our congregation is more vibrant and positive than earlier. The team warned, however, that we must also acknowledge and heal those still feeling hurt and discouraged. Every member of the congregation is encouraged to speak with any elder or deacon, or with Rev. Mueller, about any concerns or questions during this time of transition. As Rev. Mueller has told us, we must step up and serve. Your speaking up is critical to a successful future.


#### **Bible Study**
